Financing structures

Bonds (deferred payments)

- Bond: Similar to a loan, a promise made by the Issuer of the Bond (the Authority) to the purchasers of/investors in the Bond to repay the amount that was borrowed
- Revenue Bond: Paid from project revenues rather than taxes ("enterprise" funds), such as rents, tolls, fees, or other charges of the authority
- Typical Financing Structure (often tax-exempt):
 - Authority issues bonds and lends bond proceeds to private companies to finance economic development project
 - Private company agrees, in loan agreement, to build and operate economic development projects and to pay debt service on bonds

- Payments made by private companies under the loan agreement are pledged as security and are used to make the payments on the bonds
- Bonds are "limited obligations" of the Authority, payable solely from the payments made by the private company under the loan agreement
- Does not create any debt or obligation for local governments to levy taxes

Property Tax Incentives ("Bonds for Title")

- Sale-leaseback bond transaction
- Authority issues bonds and uses proceeds to purchase economic development projects from private developer
- The private company conveys the title to the Project to the Authority
- Authority is exempt from property taxes
- Private company pays property taxes based on leasehold value
- Bonds are secured by lease payments from the private company
 - While the sale-leaseback bond financing structure may be used to raise funds, often the sole purpose of the structure is to provide a reduction in property taxes
 - o In that case, a private company may "buy" the bonds
 - A private company is then both the obligor on the bonds (through lease payments) and the owner of the bonds
 - Because the private company only has a leasehold interest in the Project, rather than a fee simple interest, it pays lower property taxes during the term of the lease (the lease is generally for a specific term, with the company having the right to repurchase the property by paying off the bonds, thereby accruing equity)
- The Board of Assessors is not required to use any particular method for valuing the private company's leasehold interest; however, the Board of Assessors must establish that the method is not arbitrary or unreasonable

Why bonds over loans?

- Depends on the size of the project
- Bonds through development authorities can be tax-exempt and unrated
- Lower interest rates, lower risk
- The financing fee is maxed out and usually significantly lower than a loan origination fee
- Sometimes, you have both- deals can be stacked and allow for offsets of payments and larger incentives

SBA-Originated Loans

- SBA 7(a)
 - Up to \$5 million
 - Does not require building ownership
 - Short-term financing for acquisition, working capital, refinancing, etc.
 - Goes through a traditional bank as a lender
- SBA-504 loans
 - o Long-term (20-25 years), fixed rate

- It can be used for financing or re-financing
- The bank in the first seat provides a 50% loan; organization like CSRA Business Lending provides a 40% loan; business provides a 10% upfront capital
- CSRA Direct Loans (through CSRA Business Lending)
 - Up to \$500,000
 - 6.25% interest with 1% fee
 - Partnership with a bank- sit in second seat for subordinate debt financing
 - o Money comes from EDA, Department of Agriculture, and SBA-504 reinvestment funds

Georgia Cities Foundation/Georgia Department of Community Affairs

- Georgia Cities Loan
 - Revolving loan fund (recommended 50-40-10 structure like SBA-504)
 - Up to \$250,000, 0.75% origination fee
 - 10- to 15-year terms (balloons after 10 years)
 - o It can be used for acquisition, rehabilitation, or construction
 - o Public works, infrastructure, and operational expenses are ineligible
 - Must go through DDA and have DDA/community support
- SSBCI (State Small Business Credit Initiative)
 - o 10- to 15-year term, 3.5% fixed-interest loans, 1% origination fee
 - o Recommended 50-40-10 structure
 - Up to \$1,250,000, depending on the type of bank loan
 - Owner-occupied small businesses
 - Must be approved before construction commences; residential projects ineligible
 - It needs community support but goes through the bank and not the DDA

A DBA, also known as a trade name, allows a business to operate under a name other than its registered, legal name. A DBA must be filed in the county in which the business is registered.

Business corporations, nonprofit corporations, professional corporations, limited partnerships (LP), and limited liability companies (LLC) are formed in Georgia by filing with the Corporations Division of the Office of the Secretary of State. The quickest way to register your company is to file electronically using online services at sos.ga.gov. If you file in paper format, you may mail the required paper documents associated with the business type you are registering. Filing procedures and required forms for business entities filing in paper format can be downloaded from the Corporations Division website at sos.ga.gov/corporations-division-georgia-secretary-states-office. There is an additional \$10 service charge for filing in paper format (no service charge assessed if filed online). Upon registration and payment by the business of the required occupation tax and the appropriate fee, the License and Inspection Department shall issue a Business Tax Certificate to said business. The business owner shall display such certificate conspicuously within the business premises. The Business Tax Certificate shall automatically expire on December 31 of the year of its issuance.

Please note that personal property returns for ad valorem taxes must be submitted by April 1st of

every year. These returns should include all business assets located within the county as of January 1st. You can download the return forms from the Assessors' webpage.

The Board of Assessors is responsible for determining and defending uniform, fair market values for all taxable properties in Richmond County. This helps to establish a fair digest for the State and provides important information to the Augusta Commission, Board of Education, and Tax Commissioner for the purpose of levying and collecting property taxes.

Businesses in Georgia that sell services or products and collect state sales tax need to register with the Georgia Department of Revenue Tax Center.

A sales tax number is also called an employer identification number or state taxpayer identification number. The Georgia government specifically assigns this number to your business for licensing and tax purposes.

A monthly sales tax return showing the gross sales, gross proceeds, or cost price arising from all taxable transactions during the preceding month must be filed. A return must be filed regardless if a tax is due.

Every individual, partnership, corporation, and company with at least one employee in Georgia must file an application and obtain a withholding tax identification number. Returns and the amount of state tax withheld from an employee must be filed regardless if no state tax was withheld.

The Employer Identification Number (EIN), also known as the Federal Employer Identification Number or the Federal Tax Identification Number, is a unique nine-digit number assigned by the Internal Revenue Service to business entities operating in the United States for identification purposes. The IRS uses the number to identify taxpayers required to file business tax returns.

Businesses engaging in the sale of alcohol must apply for an alcohol license before dispensing. No alcoholic beverage may be sold, possessed for sale, or distributed in Augusta, Georgia, except under a license granted by the Augusta Commission. Wholesale alcoholic beverage dealers are not permitted to sell or make deliveries to any person or establishment that does not hold a current City and State alcoholic beverage license of the proper classification. There are fees associated with this license.

O.C.G.A. §3-2-7.1 (HB 879-2020) requires the Department of Revenue to develop and implement a state-wide centralized application process that ensures an application is sent simultaneously to the Local Licensing Authorities and the State. This new process is designated for retail alcohol licensing only and includes initial registration and renewal applications.

Three sets of plans are submitted to the <u>License & Inspection Department</u>, they will then forward a copy to the Fire Department for review and approval.

Once the plans are approved, a construction permit is issued. An 80% and 100% inspection is required. After the 100% inspection, a certificate of occupancy is issued for a fee of \$150.

Business and property owners are encouraged to clearly and properly display their property's address so that it is visible to patrolling deputies. They are further urged to contact the 911 dispatch center and list their emergency numbers, hours of operation, and 24-hour contacts in the event the owner or business representative needs to be notified of problems or concerns.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) prohibits discrimination against people with disabilities in several areas, including employment, transportation, public accommodations, communications, and access to state and local government programs and services.

Businesses are encouraged to visit the ADA website to obtain a PDF copy of the ADA Guide for Small Businesses. This document provides an illustrated overview of some basic ADA requirements for small businesses and how to make their services accessible.

For small businesses, compliance with the ADA is not difficult. To help businesses with their compliance efforts, Congress established a technical assistance program to answer questions about the ADA. Answers to your questions about the ADA are a phone call away. The Department of Justice operates a toll-free ADA Information Line (800- 514-0301 voice and 833-610-1264 TDD). In addition, tax credits and deductions were established to be used annually to offset many costs of providing access to people with disabilities.

In recognition that many small businesses can not afford to make significant physical changes to their stores or places of business to provide accessibility to wheelchair users and other people with disabilities, the ADA has requirements for existing facilities built before 1993 that are less strict than for ones built after early 1993 or modified after early 1992.
